Psychoanalysis was founded by Sigmund Freud (1856-1939). Freud believed that people could be cured by making conscious their unconscious thoughts and motivations, thus gaining insight.. The aim of psychoanalysis therapy is to release repressed emotions and experiences, i.e., make the unconscious conscious.

Psychoanalysis, with its focus on neurosis due to early childhood trauma, seemed perfectly situated to deal with war neurosis: it had an explanation for why some soldiers got "shell shock" and others did not (Oedipus complexes, inappropriately cathected libido, etc.) and it had a way to treat them (psychoanalysis).

SECOND WORLD WAR: THE EFFECT ON THE DEVELOPMENT OF PSYCHOANALYSIS. The Second World War, like the First and in spite of the upheavals it caused in the psychoanalytic movement, was the origin of the international expansion of psychoanalytic theories and practices. Three principal factors were involved: The Nazi persecutions, by forcing Jewish psychoanalysts to emigrate and by eliminating all ...

If cultural formations and historical events have their sources in our psychic functioning—that is to say, in our unconscious fears and desires,—and culture itself provides a framework for expressing, articulating, and coming to terms with these fears and desires, then psychoanalysis may help to reveal why war seems to be an inevitable and ineradicable part of human history.

In 1932, Einstein asked Freud for a psychological cure to war. Now you can send their correspondence to hotheads anywhere in the world. Freud penned a lengthy reply, explaining that the instinct to war was inherent in individuals, and that the collective wisdom of a group was needed to temper it.
